GCSE students

examination results

We were delighted with the performance of our Year 11 students. They performed exceptionally well this year placing the school amongst the top in the country. As a result, students were well prepared for their Sixth Form studies.

A total of 182 Year 11 students completed their GCSEs at Sandringham. 91% of students secured at least a 4 in English and Maths GSCE (standard pass) with 79% achieving a 5 or over (strong pass.)

The Attainment 8 score, the average of students' best 8 subjects, was 6.37, equivalent to a B grade with 43% of all grades being a grade 7 or above (A grade). The estimated Progress 8 score was 0.83 demonstrating that the Year 11 students achieved almost a whole grade higher in each subject compared to similar students in other schools nationally. This puts Sandringham in the top 100 non-selective schools, as recognised by the Department for Education.

These results mean students have been able to secure their chosen career path for the future. A total of 131 Year 13 students completed Level 3 studies at Sandringham. Their average points score for Alevels was 42, equivalent to a B Grade.

40% of all grades were A*-A and over 70% A*-B with a 100% pass rate at A-level.
