




The Handmaid's Tale

Margaret Atwood:




Tess of the D'ubervilles


Never Let Me Go Kazuo Ishiguro:

Becoming *Michelle Obama:*



Brave New World


Aldous Huxley:

1984 George Orwell:

Yet he inwardly rebels against the totalitarian world he lives in, which demands absolute obedience and controls him through the telescreens.



Half of a Yellow Sun Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie:

In 1960s Nigeria, Ugwu, a boy from a poor village, goes to work for Odenigbo, a university professor and Olanna, a woman who has abandoned a life of privilege to live with him. Then Richard arrives, a writer, who falls in love with Olanna's sister Kainene. But when the horror of war engulfs the nation their lives pull apart.






The Remains of the Day

Kazuo Ishiguro:



The Easter Parade Richard Yates:



Colson Whitehead:



The Parable of the Sower


Octavia Butler:

Normal People Sally Rooney:


Sally Rooney's Normal People follows the intersecting story of Marianne and Connell as they navigate the changing landscape of their relationship into adulthood.






Rebecca

Daphne du Maurier:




Catch 22 Joseph Heller:


The Argonoughts Maggie Nelson:


On Chesil Beach lan McEwan:
