Summer Work 2023, Pre-Course Preparations

Please ensure you have completed the following tasks ahead of your first lessons in September.

1. **Be clear about the main levels of language and the principal word classes.** Create a glossary for the following terms: syntax, semantics, pragmatics, phonetics, nouns, pronouns, adjectives, adverbs, conjunctions, prepositions. You are advised to create this in a Google Doc or digitally, you will add to this document as you progress through the course.

Submission – Please bring a copy to your first lesson, ready to share with Ms Potter and Ms Clifford.

2. **Prepare a text exploring its key representations.** You will need to research and read an article (subject of your choice) and consider how language has been used to present the topic and ideas it discusses. You might want to begin by considering the writer and the audience, how opinions and facts are presented, and if there are specific language methods used for effect. When choosing a text, you might want to consider an article, an extract from fiction or non-fiction writing.

Submission – Present your articles and your findings in a short presentation. Share your presentation with Ms Potter.

3. Investigate a language concept or issue. Prepare a short presentation about an aspect of English Language that you are especially interested in or would like to explore further. This might be something you are curious about, a linguistic concept or a social issue related to language. (You might want to explore the texts and podcasts below as a starting point.) Your presentation should be about 3-5 minutes long, again, you might want to use Google Slides.

Submission – Present your investigation to Ms Clifford.
