

When to apply for 2024 entry



• Extra: for students who get no offers. This avoids waiting for clearing. Students can apply for any course with vacancies. Extra is open from early February and closes at the beginning of July.

 Clearing: courses with vacancies are advertised on <u>www.UCAS.com</u> for students who don't achieve the grades they hoped to in the summer. (Students contact institutes directly).

Oxbridge



- Deadline for applications is 16th October, internal deadline 29th
 September.
- Applicant tests will now be used for both universities.
- Offers are likely to be A*AA or A*A*A
- Students have had a lot of guidance already, and should have undertaken research and extra reading throughout the year

Applying - Key Facts

- 1. Register with UCAS via the Hub
- 2. Use a username and password to apply online
- Make up to 5 choices, unless applying to Oxbridge and/or applying for medicine, veterinary medicine/science, dentistry – then it's 4 choices
- 4. Students can't apply to BOTH Oxford and Cambridge
- 5. If they are applying for the early deadline, they must submit all choices by that deadline
- 6. Applying costs £27.50 for up to 5 choices
- 7. Universities can't see other choices when you apply
- 8. Students choose a first choice and an insurance choice

Sandringham Deadlines

Friday 29th September: Oxbridge/ Medicine/ Veterinary Science

Friday 20th October: All other subjects

Choosing the right university for you

Style – from the traditional, with a focus on subject-based courses and research, to modern universities, with a greater focus on vocational courses.

Location – some are based in large cities, others in smaller towns - a major influence on the environment and lifestyle.

Size – larger universities can have more than 20,000 students, whereas some of the smallest have only a few thousand.

Culture and facilities – influenced by a range of factors, including the diversity of students who attend.

What graduates do – all universities collect destination statistics. It can be interesting to find out the types of jobs or further study students go on to.

Tuition fees – can vary between universities and colleges. Check if there are any scholarships or bursaries available.

Living costs – accommodation, transport, and food can vary enormously.

Choosing the right course for you

- What does the course cover?
- Courses with the same title may be very different.
- Look carefully at the core course content, and the range of optional studies/modules available.
- Which modules are the most interesting and relevant to your career aspirations?
- See if the course or university/college offers any internship, placement, or study abroad opportunities.
- How is the course taught structured teaching, or more independent research? How many lectures are there, and how much group work will be done in seminars?
- How is the course assessed?

Predicted grades

- Universities make offers based on the grades the school predicts.
- We will issue predicted grades in September.
- We will use a range of data, including Threshold Exam grades.
- Predicted grades will be aspirational but achievable and data-driven.

Universities may make offers in two ways

Subject specific grades e.g. AAA, ABB

Or Tariff points e.g. 120 points (BBB)

BTEC quals also carry points

AS points don't count if continuing with A level.

UCAS reference changes for 2024 entry

- There are 3 sections:
 - A general statement about your school/college/centre setting the context which will be the same for each student
 - Details of extenuating circumstances which have impacted the student's education
 - Outline other supportive information relevant to the applicant and the course they are applying for (this is where subject references go) - your reference will be closely linked to your predicted grade
- Much more emphasis on contextual information for each student.

UCAS Timeline

- June 2023 further research and begin personal statements.
- Tutor and 6th form staff discussions with students June/July 2023
- Personal Development sessions in June, July and September.
- First completed draft of Personal Statements is to be handed in on Monday 11th September

Form tutors continue to work with students throughout the process to support their research and writing of the personal statement.

Looking ahead

- Students should continue to research and decide what type of university (campus, city) and which course they would like to study at university.
- Summer Term: Complete Personal details and GCSE results on UCAS form.
- Visit universities over the summer.
- If necessary, adjust choices after threshold exam results
- Complete a first draft of their personal statement ready to hand in to their tutor in Sept.
- ELD in September UCAS day in school finalising applications.

Next steps

- Subject teachers write a UCAS reference for individual subjects
- Students submit preference for their personal statement (July)
- Once the student has completed their application and sent it, the form is checked and each reference is read and polished by Sixth Form team.


How parents can help
